Candidates for Officer Positions and Building Representatives

Members of the West St. Paul Federation of Teachers were scheduled to vote for the following positions from **Monday, April 11, to Wednesday, April 13, 2016**. Each candidate was asked to submit a short biography with his/her name. Candidates have submitted their names for all available positions. There was one applicant for each position, so in following our Constitutional guidelines, no voting will need to take place. Please find the biographies for each of your newly appointed officers.

President:

My name is Diane Thompson and I am running for President of the West St. Paul Federation of Teachers. I have served as President for the past eight years. I have been involved with our union since 1995, when I became the Treasurer. I served as Treasurer from 1995 until 2008. I also served as a Negotiator from 1998 until 2008, when I became President.

I have been in District 197 since 1989. I currently teach Math at Heritage Middle School. I have also taught at Somerset and Pilot Knob.

I want to continue as President of the WSPFT because I believe in the mission of our union, an organization working for better salaries, benefits, and support for teachers. I have worked hard supporting teachers in our union for over 20 years. I have participated in many trainings provided by Education Minnesota; Member Rights Training, Certified Negotiators Training, Local President's Training, and Treasurer's Training. I have attended Education Minnesota's Summer Seminar, School Law Conference, Bargaining Conference, and Representative Convention. I attended my first national convention last summer - AFT TEACH in Washington D.C. It was interesting and informative to connect with teachers from all over the United States. I also regularly attend Metro Council meetings to keep informed about other metro locals.

Being an effective President requires organization, planning, listening, and communicating. There are many issues that occur simultaneously, and the President needs to be able to juggle several issues at once. It's a rare day when there are just a few situations to resolve. I believe I possess the qualities it takes to keep our union running efficiently. I care about teachers and the issues they face each day. I care about keeping teaching a middle class career for the next generation of teachers. We need a fair salary, good benefits, and a pension that will help retirees have a decent retirement. Our union has been in existence for over 60 years, and I want to ensure it remains strong for at least the next 60 years.

Vice President:

My name is Phil Hayes and I am pleased to announce my candidacy for Vice President of the West St. Paul Federation of Teachers 1148. I have spent the last four years as a building representative for Friendly Hills. In addition, I have completed member rights training with Education Minnesota, participated on the district's Educational Policy Committee (EPC) and served as co-chair for the Organizing for Settlement Committee. During my tenure as a building rep, I have developed a thorough understanding of the complexities of our teachers' union.

My primary role as the Vice President should be to advocate for all members of the union. I am committed to serving our union in the years to come.

Treasurer:

Secretary:

My name is Dr. Kristy Otte. I am running for Secretary of the West St. Paul Federation of Teachers. My work in the union stems from my commitment to equity and social justice issues in our public schools. For students to be successful, we need to operate in environments that allow us to be successful. Workplace environment, respectful treatment of teachers, fair contracts and benefits, and the ability to have integrity in our work directly connects to the outcomes our students have in our schools. I believe in professionalism in teaching, advocacy for public education, and ongoing, high quality professional development for teachers. This is what unionism in education is all about. Equity, advocacy, and improving schools for students is integral to the work we do. I am an Instructional Peer Coach and ESL teacher who has worked in both middle schools, three elementary schools, and the high school. My experience and training has benefited my work as Local 1148 secretary. I have served WSPFT teachers for 15 years in multiple roles including secretary, building representative, grassroots advocate, member of EPC, Constitution, and Audit committees, and website administrator. My union training includes attending Education Minnesota's Summer Seminar four times where I was able to receive in depth training in website design, labor issues, member rights and advocacy, local secretary roles, and mediation. Furthermore, I have received training through Education Minnesota in the areas of grassroots advocacy and organizing for settlement. As a representative to EM's representative convention three times, I voted for union resolutions for our 70,000 members across the state. As a delegate twice to the American Federation of Teachers convention, I see the importance of staying connected to the national dialogue around teacher's unions and public education. As secretary, you can expect me to continue my professional development as a union leader through training and outreach. My work includes staying informed of union news and providing context for members through records, the WSPFT website and social media. I hope to continue building professional collegiality between teachers, serve as a resource and liaison for union members, and improve our local through teacher leadership.

Negotiators:

Anne Bolsem

Over the past eighteen years, I have had the privilege of teaching at GEMS as well as serving as an Instructional Peer Coach in the ATPPS program. During this time, I have embraced a variety of leadership positions at both the union and district level as a representative for my colleagues. These roles have provided me the opportunity to develop a global view of both the celebrations and challenges encountered by teachers in a variety of roles, sites, programs, and levels throughout our district. With this big picture in mind, I hope to continue improving our local by speaking on behalf of our members honestly and fairly as a negotiator and member of our Executive Board.

relating to teacher rights. Additionally, I have been a member of both the Educational Polices Committee and the Meet and Confer Committee, engaging in conversations with the school district representatives regarding specific topics relating to processes and procedures. I served on the Teacher Development and Evaluation Writing Committee to create a plan that met the MN State Statute requirements. I have also participated in the District Staff Development Advisory Committee and the Strategic Redesign Advisory Committee. I currently serve on the TDE/ATPPS Oversight Committee and the Garlough Focus Team, and I also work with new staff at GEMS as the Site Mentor. My philosophy has always been to speak up, take action, and be a part of changes, rather than to sit back and watch change occur. I believe I can be a voice for my colleagues, be a representative for individuals as a part of a whole, and be an advocate for all teachers, regardless of site, level, position, or program. I desire the opportunity to continue serving our membership with integrity and authenticity in the role of negotiator in order to work toward an even stronger body of united educators.

Read Your Contract/Know Your Rights

Please take the time to read your contract and know your rights. If there are concerns about your teaching/supervision/prep time schedule, contact your building rep, Don Nelson, or Diane Thompson. If you are doing curriculum work or supervision assignments, you should get paid

according to the contract. Also, watch carefully for any changes in working conditions. It is easier to resolve these issues when they first occur.

<u>Use Negotiated Benefits</u> <u>Wisely</u>

Please do not abuse or misuse benefits the Federation has worked hard to obtain.

- Participate fully in Professional Development days.
- Honor the intentions of End of Quarter days by working on grades and other teaching tasks.
- Use your sick leave/personal days wisely. Teachers will be disciplined for misuse of sick days.

Meeting with Administrators

Most meetings with administrators go well; however, Federation members always have the right to have union representation when meeting with administrators regarding discipline issues. Please call your building rep, Don Nelson, or Diane Thompson if you need assistance with any issue.

Resolving Issues

We encourage members to resolve issues at the building level first. If unsuccessful, try to resolve issues with the help of the Federation and district level administrators.

Sunshine

Please contact Julie Schiltgen at Friendly Hills if you know a teacher who is undergoing surgery or has a death in his/her immediate family. The Federation sends a card and a small monetary gift on these occasions.

Preapproval of Credits

If you are denied preapproval of credits for a lane change, please let Don Nelson or Diane Thompson know right away so the union can decide if it should be grieved.

Volunteering

Be careful about volunteering for too many committees. Remember, what you agree to in September or October when you are fresh from the summer break may become a stressful burden later in the year. Keep in mind you have no contractual obligation to serve on a committee.

Your Union Dues

The money you pay in dues each month is divided among four organizations. Full time teachers pay \$860. The dues breakdown is:

Education Minnesota - \$451 AFT and NEA - \$238.56 WSPFT - \$155.44 Trades and Labor - \$15.00

As you can see, our local uses \$155.44 of your yearly dues. This money goes to pay for officer salaries, office supplies, food for meetings, etc.
